

# Gurney's Car Heads Field

DAYTONA BEACH (AP) — A Ford-powered Lotus driven by Dan Gurney of Costa Mesa, Calif. will head the field in today's 250-mile American Challenge Cup race at the Daytona International Speedway.

Gurney turned in the best lap in the four hours of qualifying Friday afternoon when he was clocked in 115.163 miles per hour.

A. J. Foyt, the Indianapolis 500 veteran, was second with 112.790 clocking in Scarab Me-com.

Former Mexican champ, Pedro Rodriguez, in a Ferrari Proto No. 250 was third best qualifier, turning the 3.81 mile course at an average speed of 105.670 MPH.

The qualifying was marred by a serious accident involving James R. McCain of Atlanta. McCain's Chevrolet-powered Lister flipped in the backstretch and he was trapped in the wreckage.

Although listed in satisfactory condition at the Halifax District Hospital, Dr. A. Monaco said there was a possibility McCain would lose two or three fingers and possibly his hand. Surgery was delayed indefinitely because McCain was in shock.

Drivers qualifying Friday also were trying to earn a spot in Sunday's 2,000 kilometer Daytona Continental grand touring road race.

## Race Driver Hurt In Crash

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Ross McCain, a 28-year-old race car driver from Atlanta, was injured Friday when the engine on his roadster exploded during a practice lap. The open-top car flipped over three times and skidded 300 feet upside down at the Daytona Speedway.

A spectator leaped a fence and pulled McCain from the 1960 Lister roadster. The car did not burn.

"He was conscious when I reached him," said the rescuer, Kenneth Erb of Miami. "But he didn't say anything. He was just moaning."

McCain, who won the Paul Whitman trophy in 1961, was practicing for the 250-mile American Challenge Cup race Saturday when the accident happened.

McCain, a biochemist at Emory University, was first listed in very poor condition at the speedway's infirmary but at Halifax Hospital later doctors listed him as satisfactory.

He suffered internal injuries, a crushed right arm and face and back burns. Doctors said he will undergo arm surgery.

## Musial Takes Fitness Job

ST. LOUIS (AP) — President Lyndon Johnson announced Friday that retired St. Louis Cardinal star Stan Musial will head the nation's physical fitness program.

"There are few men who have served as American heroes with such dignity," the President said of Musial. "He has brought to his profession simple honesty and character. I am proud to have Stan The Man — always true and, most of all, true to himself."

The President made the announcement during his visit Friday to St. Louis to open the city's bicentennial celebration.

Musial said it was a great honor to be part of the physical fitness program.

"I plan to put all my efforts behind the President's program," he said. "I hope I can do a capable job."

Musial, who retired after 22 years with the Cardinals, is a vice president with the National League team. He said he will continue in the position while handling his duties in the President's program.

He will be the second man to take over the job.

Bud Wilkinson, former University of Oklahoma coach, was named to head the program by the late President John F. Kennedy, who initiated the idea. Wilkinson quit the post and his coaching job at Oklahoma to enter the 1964 race for the Senate.

## Ortiz Favored Over Elorde

MANILA (AP) — Carlos Ortiz, the world lightweight titleholder, was installed a 7-5 favorite Friday to defeat Filipino southpaw Flash Elorde in their scheduled 15-round title match tonight.

The bout, being billed as a battle of champions, is expected to draw a record turnout of 60,000 spectators to the outdoor Rizal football stadium.

Despite the odds favoring the Puerto Rican-born New Yorker, Elorde said, "I have at least a 50-50 chance to win." The Filipino holds the world junior lightweight and the Oriental lightweight crowns.

## KEYDETS FAVORITES

### State Indoor Games Today

LEXINGTON — Superb conditioning and strength-in-depth are expected to give VMI another team championship here today in the sixth edition of the Virginia Intercollegiate Indoor Games.

Some of the other 12 colleges in the field may capture more individual honors in the 13-event program at the VMI Fieldhouse, but an anticipated host of seconds and thirds should make VMI the titlist.

That's the formula the Keydets used last winter when they made a shambles of the meet by stacking up 70 points to only 45 for runnerup Virginia Tech and 38 for third-place William and Mary.

FOUR defending champions will be in the field of about 125 varsity athletes who will join 125 freshmen in concurrent competition starting at 2 p. m. with finals in the varsity broad jump. The night program, including most of the finals, begins at 6:30.

There's not much doubt that the outstanding individual competitor will be William and Mary's lean sophomore distance sensation, Jim Johnson, who only two weeks ago won the award as the standout runner in the VMI Winter Relays in this same fieldhouse.

Depending on which events he enters, Johnson could crack no fewer than three meet records—the 9:56.1 mark for the two-mile, the 4:24.9 mark for the mile, and the 1:58.1 mark for the 880.
