

Mishap Mars Qualifying

Gurney Will Head Field in 250-Mile Daytona Feature

DAYTONA BEACH (AP)—A Ford-powered Lotus driven by Dan Gurney of Costa Mesa, Calif. will head the field in today's 250-mile American Challenge Cup race at the Daytona International Speedway.

Gurney turned in the best lap in the four hours of qualifying yesterday when he was clocked in 115.163 miles per hour.

A. J. Foyt, the Indianapolis 500 veteran, was second with 112.790 clocking in Scarab Me-com.

Former Mexican champ, Pedro Rodriguez, in a Ferrari Pro-to No. 250 was third best quali-er, turning the 3.81 mile course at an average speed of 106.670 MPH.

The qualifying was marred by a serious accident involving James R. McCain of Atlanta. McCain's Chevrolet - powered Lister flipped in the backstretch and he was trapped in the wreckage.

A spectator leaped a fence and pulled McCain from the 1960 Lister roadster. The car did not burn.

"He was conscious when I reached him," said the rescuer, Kenneth Erb of Miami. "But he didn't say anything. He was just moaning."

Although listed in satisfactory condition at the Halifax District Hospital, Dr. A. Monaco said there was a possibility McCain would lose two or three fingers and possibly his hand. Surgery was delayed indefinitely be-

cause McCain was in shock.

Drivers qualifying yesterday also were trying to earn a spot in tomorrow's 2,000 kilometer Daytona Continental grand touring road race.

Golfers Hot in Cold Tucson Wind

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Australia's Bruce Devlin and Texan Rex Baxter outbattled a rigid wind and their fellow pros yesterday to share the midway lead in a \$30,000 Tucson Open Golf Tournament with scores of 136, eight under par.

DeVlin posted the score of the day, a 67, while power-hitting Baxter had a two-under-par 70 on the wind-blown desert 49ers Country Club course.

Ernie Vossler, who was dead-locked with Baxter at the end of the first round, blew to a 79 and 145 total. South Africa's Gary Player, the only one of the Big Three playing in Tucson, had his troubles with a 75 and 147.

Musial Still Strong Fitness Advocate

ST. LOUIS (AP)—Stan Musial, The Man from St. Louis whose devotion to physical fitness helped him set scores of National League baseball records, yesterday was named head of the federal physical fitness program by President Johnson.

Musial, 43, who succeeds former Oklahoma football coach Bud Wilkinson in the post, retired as an active player at the end of last season.

He immediately accepted a position as a vice president of

the St. Louis Cardinals. He said he planned to go to spring training with the club this year and would work with the younger players.

"I'll start working out early in the year," the trim, pleasant man said at the time. "I'll take daily calisthenics and workouts. I think physical fitness serves a very valuable purpose for everyone—not just athletes."

It was that devotion to physical fitness that helped Musial to one of baseball's greatest,

most durable careers.

He broke into the professional ranks as a skinny, left-handed pitcher from Donora, Pa., with Williamson in the Mountain States League, in baseball's lower minors. He developed arm trouble, switched to the outfield and joined the Cardinals in 1941.

He was 6 feet tall and weighed 175 pounds, about five pounds less than his current weight.

His attention to his condition was a major factor in his durability. Among his National League records are those for most games played, 3,026; most years leading the league in games played, five; most consecutive games played, 885; and he holds baseball's all-time mark for the most seasons playing 100 or more games, 20.

He's a mild, smiling fellow who has made thousands of friends both off the field and on through his courteous manner and infallible good humor. He has long been one of the most

Hayes Seeks Mark

Mason-Dixon Track Records Threatened

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—The Mason-Dixon Games tonight promise some fierce battles among competitors and some attacks on the track and field records books.

Florida A&M's Bob Hayes will try to break one of his own world sprinting records—the 70-yard dash.

Boston's John Thomas, who has high jumped consistently over seven feet this year, is almost certain to top the Mason-Dixon record.

Putting the shot will be South-

ern California's Dallas Long, the world record holder.

A two-mile relay duel is expected between the Georgetown University team, which set a world indoor record of 7:29 here last year, and Villanova, which has since lowered the mark to 7:26.4.

Georgetown has one of five American or world indoor records set last year on the eight-lap-to-the-mile, banked board track at Louisville's Freedom Hall. Most indoor tracks have 11 or 12 laps to the mile.
